Minister

Throughout this year, the Gospel of Matthew has been the primary source of inspiration for worship, challenge and encouragement in our congregations. The overarching theme of the Gospel of Matthew is "God is with us" for it is introduced as both our experience of Jesus Christ (1:23) at the beginning of the Gospel and as the hope for the future at the end of the Gospel (26:20).

First, some Biblical background on this theme. In the Creation Story, God the Creator is present inside the creation as well as outside it as its source. In Genesis, it is impossible to understand the creation, the human creature, life and purpose without God present with us, sustaining and engaging with us. God speaks to Abraham. God appears to Abraham, Moses. People are delivered from the violence and oppression of slavery into a new future in which they were to live according to the principles of love: in a love relationship with God, and in a love relationship with others.

However, the journey into nationalism, kingship, warfare and the making and sustaining of enemies misappropriated the relationship of God with his people, and "God is with us" became a war cry (Isaiah 8:10). The prophet then calls the people to a new future in which "every warrior's boot used in battle and every garment rolled in blood will be destined for burning, as fuel for a fire – for unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." (Isaiah 9:5,6). Immanuel is thus no longer a war cry but a declaration that we have returned to the way of God, to live according to the principles of peace. And it was this notion that was claimed by the early followers of the risen Christ.

Those who had met Jesus, recognized that Jesus was indeed "God with us – Immanuel". The early church also lived in a time of violence, military occupation, oppression and persecution, yet they recognized that God was with them, that God's way was one of non-violence, that it was impossible to make sense of life without realising that God is with us, sustaining and engaging with us because of his ultimate mercy and grace.

And so we discover the beauty of relationships, the joy of community, the greater strength of non-violence and forgiveness, and the richness of life lived knowing God is with us. During the months that I have been among you, I have been richly encouraged and honoured to have experienced your fellowship. It has been abundantly clear that God is with you and has called you and formed you and sustained you in your witness to his grace.

Thank you for your harmonious partnership with one another. Thank you for your commitment to others whether in Solomon Islands, Palmwoods, North India, or Tonga. Thank you for your hospitality, grace and inclusion of people of different abilities, status, health, language, history, political persuasion and thought. Thank you for your commitment to mission and witness as evidenced in support of community care, chaplaincy, festivals, children's ministry, fun days, care of aged people. Thank you for your accountability in using the gifts God has given you to serve in the community as leaders, healers, mercy givers, administrators, artists, musicians, teachers, helpers, carers, evangelists, artisans, providers of hospitality, honest workmen, managers of people and managers of the environment. Thank you for the beauty you have revealed. Thank you for your commitment to each other, to the gathered community and to the Lord Jesus Christ – Immanuel.

Joint Mission Team

The Interim Ministry Exercise report prepared by Rev Graham Dempster in 2014 recommended that a Joint Mission Team be established to develop broad mission goals that touch all four churches.

The report indicated that all four churches had a number of things in common:

- all want to be meaningfully involved in their local community;
- all are committed to ecumenical endeavour;
- all want to have greater contact with families and children;
- all have good pastoral caring systems in place;
- all hope to see the other churches flourish as the local gathering of God's people;
- all desire to be working within Synod guidelines e.g. *Together on the Way*

The Joint Mission Team consisted of Jean Beech, Colin Brewer, Bob Eather, Allan Gillespie, and Murray Robertson (chair). Its task was to develop a set of common missional goals, with the Joint Management Committee then taking responsibility for enunciating these broad goals, including '*Together on the Way*', and each church then deciding on how it meets those goals in its local context.

The team drew on the existing congregational goals in the Montville and Maleny congregations, the *Together on the Way* materials, input from Presbytery, as well as consulting widely with the congregations at strategic stages of the process. At the time of developing these goals, the Palmwoods congregation was at a critical point of internal transition and it was decided that they continue to do so, unencumbered by additional tasks.

The set of agreed Missional Goals provides a vision for ministry and mission, and has been embedded into our Blackall Range Profile and endorsed by Presbytery.

The next step will be for each congregation to put these goals into practice. The team recognises that our ability to achieve our mission goals will depend on our resources and energy, but let us be "open to new ways, new ideas and new directions" as we take some small steps into an encouraging future.

Outreach

Our mission goal is TO BE ACTIVELY ENGAGED IN SHARING THE LOVE OF JESUS WITH ALL PEOPLE.

We do this as we CONNECT with others to share with them the Good News of salvation that comes to us by God's grace through a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. "...go into all the world.."

This report highlights the Outreach activities that we have used this year in response to this goal.

Mothers Day

Between 9 and 11 am on Mothers Day, a group of men, led by Bob Eather, gave out approximately 350 chrysanthemum as thanks to women for being mothers, grandmothers, aunts, daughters and all their valued roles in our community. Flowers were also handed to the ladies working in the nearby shops. (Thanks Ray). The site outside the MCU building against IGA was ideal for ready access to the people walking the street.

There were looks of delight when ladies discovered it was a gift which was received with thanks; most flowers were affixed to lapels or in their hair, worn proudly. This made it easy to identify who had already been given flowers.

At the debrief after the event, all our group found the highlight was the delight in the recipients' eyes when it registered this was unconditional giving, making us feel we were touching many hearts.

Some men, while we were giving the flowers, either ducked up to the flower shop to buy flowers with guilty looks on their faces, or asked for a flower to give their better half.

A few people came back later to ask who we represented and to thank us for our gift.

Maleny Christmas Street Carnival

For the third year Maleny Church distributed around 900 pieces of cake and 250 balloons at the street carnival. This year, reorganised cutting and wrapping reduced the time taken by the crew to 1.5 hours. Thanks Douglas for organising the plastic bags and punching the cards.

All cakes and balloons were donated. This year the organising committee requested a food licence or an exemption. We were able to get an exemption. Many thanks to Bob Eather and his team of willing helpers who cut and wrapped the cake, operated the stall between 6 and 8pm and distributed the cakes and balloons to the crowd.

National Day of Thanksgiving

The church was invited to join other churches for an outreach on the National Day of Thanksgiving, when community volunteers are recognised. Despite the rain, the fun day in the park proved to be a success. Our church stall contained activities for the children (Bob Grice and Murray) to keep themselves entertained, we handed out resources and gifts from Blue Care, and the Kangra team (Paul and Lyndall Moore) had cards on sale. There was plenty of opportunity to engage in conversation with adults and children alike.

Christmas Tree Festival

In 2014, the Christmas Tree Festival partnered with the Blackall Range Care Group (BRCG) which provides a wide range of client-based services across the Blackall Range community. Fund raising from donations and sale of trees meant that the Festival was able to present a cheque for \$1500 to the BRCG. This is the largest amount raised since the first festival in 2012. It just keeps growing.

The theme of any "Christmas Song or Carol" attracted many and varied interpretations and all were unique in their own way. From the humorous to the more serious, they all reflected the love and joy that comes at Christmas. With over 600 visitors we feel that the festival makes a real impact on our community. It was especially heartening to have four other churches as well as our own Montville and Palmwoods churches represented. A truly ecumenical event. The tree sales in Maple Street provided opportunities for conversation and outreach.

Thea Caffin, CEO of the BRCG, was delighted with all aspects of the festival. Volunteers and clients had fun building their "Aussie Jingle Bells" Tree, complete with the thunder box. Many clients and families also enjoyed a visit to the festival.

Thea said that the donation will be used to fit out a storage space with shelving and lining, in the Maleny Office behind the Maleny Hospital. Thea added that the BRCG continues to expand, especially in the Maleny area where 60% of the 900 clients are now living. The donation will enable staff and volunteers to continue to provide this valuable service in the Maleny area.

The trees also provided a fitting service for the inspirational and well attended Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services.

But above all the festival was a time when our church could reach out with love and compassion to our Maleny community, "sharing the love of Jesus with all people"

I would like to thank all members of the committee, plus members of the congregation and the wider community, who put in so much time and energy and prayer to make this festival a unique outreach into our community.

Treasurer

Reporting on the Maleny financial position is complicated because the three Blackall Range Uniting Churches operate a combined bank account and share the cost of ministry, administration, Synod charges and the Manse. The sharing is done in proportion to the total offerings received from the respective congregations in the preceding three years. (Maleny's share in 2014 was 61%).

Maleny/Kenilworth, Montville and Palmwoods congregations are responsible for approving their own annual budgets. The three budgets are then combined to give the operating budget for the Blackall Range cluster.

Synod requires an annual financial report for the Blackall Range entity and the accounts have to be approved by an independent auditor. The **Blackall Range Accounts** for 2014 show a **decrease of \$16,585** in our cash position. This depletion of funds was due to expenses incurred at the Manse – totalling \$28,000. (Payments for maintenance and capital works at the Manse are made from our Reserves and not from our Operating Account.)

Income and expenditure transactions for the Blackall Range are allocated to the relevant churches, so that regular financial reporting can be done against the budgets for the respective churches. The **Maleny Summary of Cash Flows**, for the Year Ending 31st December 2014, is as follows:

Prayer

Each Sunday when our Welcome to Worship is projected on the screen, we see our commitment to be a prayerful, listening church.

This is recognition that prayer needs to be at the centre of who we are, where we are going, and everything we do.

All our efforts, no matter how sincere, will come to little unless God is in them. Hence the importance of consistently and earnestly seeking His guidance, His resourcing and His help.

It is now three years since we have had a Prayer Champion to lead us in making prayer a priority for our congregation. Together with a small band of folk who agreed to form a prayer team, I have sought to hold the reins on an interim basis. However, we urgently need a Prayer Coordinator if we are to fully embrace our vision of being a prayerful, listening church.

Throughout the year I have issued prayer bulletins by email every three or four weeks and to ensure all major initiatives and events have been covered by prayer. Prayer has also been an important part of our church services, the meditation group, small groups and our various meetings. I have also taken the opportunity to preach on the subject of prayer and to encourage the setting aside of time daily for reflection on God's word and prayer.

However, more needs to be done to strengthen this vital prayer ministry and, in particular, a Prayer Coordinator would be able to help us in the following areas:-

- Keep prayer constantly before the congregation by encouraging us in our personal devotions and prayer and providing training and resources to help folk of all ages in our quiet times.
- Arranging regular prayer gatherings so that appropriate time is spent in corporate prayer for our minister, church leaders, our programmes and events, specific outreaches, specific ministries, our sister congregations and other churches, missions such as Kangra, and for wider issues.
- Setting up prayer vigils for specific activities and outreaches or for national or international emergencies and disasters.
- Establishing a prayer chain which can be activated quickly in the event of an urgent request for prayer.
- Promoting and coordinating the weekly prayer slips in the pews and ensuring prayer requests are actioned and appropriate information is passed to the Pastoral Care team and our minister.
- Coordinating a roster of leaders available to pray with folk after a service and promoting the availability of this ministry.

Spontaneous prayer is wonderful and to be encouraged, but effective prayer needs to be focussed, earnest, consistent and persistent. Prayer is not for just when we feel like it – we are commanded to pray. Jesus set us the example and if it was necessary for Jesus, how much more for us. Prayer is fundamental and vital for us as individuals if we are to lead joyful and meaningful lives and for our church if we are to be the witnesses we are called to be to the Good News of the Gospel.

The operative word is 'welcome' to share time in the presence of our faithful God, and enjoy the friendship of the group.

Children and Families

Despite the fact that the age of the great majority of our congregation is over 65, there is a heart to see more families with young children as part of our church family – and this has consistently been reflected in our priorities and the prayers of our prayer team.

No church in Maleny has a vibrant children's or youth programme, The Combined Churches Primary School Kids Club no longer functions and the Combined Churches Youth Group was put in mothballs in the middle of last year. There are many children and young people in Maleny, as evidenced by school enrolments, but there is an acute shortage of parent type Christian leaders to run children's programmes and attract young people.

Having said this, there has remained a faithful ministry to families and children in our church for the small (but at last growing) number of families and children associated with us. In summary, the past year has seen:-

- Consistent prayer for God to send families and children into our church.
- The offering of Kids Biz every Sunday during the church service for primary-aged children.
- A regular Kids' slot in all our church services when children are present.
- Two well attended Fun Day outreaches at Easter and September school holidays where contact was made with a large number of families and where the Gospel message was shared with the kids.
- Support for chaplaincy at both Primary School and High School through financial contributions and representation on Chaplaincy Committees.
- Involvement in Religious Education teaching and reading assistance at Maleny Primary School.
- Continuing to provide an equipped cry room for families with babies attending services and other meetings at the church.
- Provision of activity bags for small children during church services.
- Maintenance of a Kids' Corner in the church where children can play and read during church services and meetings.
- Provision of a covered fenced area adjacent to the hall where children can play during church activities.
- Contribution of a Fun Day Tree at the Christmas Tree Festival.
- Giving out of balloons to children at the Christmas Street Carnival.
- Involvement of children from time to time in church services and in the Christmas Eve pageant.
- Increased visitation to families during the year by our ministers.

The Children and Families Team met recently with our new Minister. Catherine has had significant experience as a Families and Children's Pastor and we are looking forward to working with her to further develop our ministry in this important area. Please thank God for the delightful families we currently have and continue to pray that we will gain the critical mass necessary to attract more families and children to fellowship together with us. Pray that we will be welcoming and that we will be relevant to the issues that are important to them at this stage of their lives. This may well involve commencing some parallel ministries which we will all need to affirm and support, even if it takes us a little out of our comfort zones.

Small Group meeting at Roger Smith's

This small group was founded by Brian Ross a few years ago and continues to be regularly attended by 7 to 10 people. This group utilises a variety of material (book excerpts, movie clips, songs, bible verses, etc) to generate lively and open discussion around current topics, issues and questions.

Most of 2014 sessions revolved around the Bonsai analogy to Christianity: The Japanese art of bonsai gardening can be compared to the common approach to Christianity today – that is a candy coated pretend everything is fine faith that folks walk aimlessly in and a very stunted, contrived and internally weak rendition of what God intended us to be. The wires that shape a bonsai tree have a similar effect to the invisible wires that tend to shape and control our lives. These invisible yet very effective 'wires' come from a variety of sources and unless and until we choose to cut those wires, we tend to be controlled by them. Throughout the year we explored and examined what 'wires' control and stunt our spiritual growth.

Later in the year the theme changed to "A Near Life Experience" and that theme has continued into the commencement of our 2015 meetings. This theme examines how we can create habits that generate and maintain spiritual highs or so called mountain top experiences. The major focus for the last year was to achieve our goal of raising \$350,000 Capital fund to support 50 places for girls at Kangra Hostel, in North India. Amazingly, due to hard work and generosity of many people, this goal was achieved before the middle of the year.

We give grateful thanks to all involved.

As well, the women of the church and community combined to create 36 beautiful quilts, for the girls at Kangra Hostel. This represented a huge amount of work and commitment.

Finally, a group of four members of Maleny Church and three others travelled to India, taking all the quilts with them in August. They spent 3 days with the girls in Kangra, and presented each girl with a quilt, which will be their own to keep. This was a most moving experience for them and us. As there are currently only 22 girls in residence, the remainder of the quilts will be kept for future gifts as new girls come into the Hostel.

We give thanks to God for the opportunity to serve our neighbours in this way, and look forward to continuing the relationship with our partners in the Church of North India.

We need to remind ourselves that our goals have been as follows, and that these may need to be adjusted as we look ahead in 2015:

It is pleasing to see the construction of the amphitheatre between the church and Obi creek. This will be an asset for outdoor activities. Thank you to all the willing guys for this work.

A new LED floodlight replaces the bollard light adjacent to the Life Line bin. An external power point has been installed on the verandah near the kitchen.

A mowing roster has been implemented. Thank you, Peter Callaghan, for doing the roster and organising the induction of the team.

We are looking at extra storage which can be constructed on the end verandah near Ben Bryce Park. This would have easy access from the sliding door onto the verandah near the sanctuary. The size of this room would be 2600x3600 (2.6mx3.6m).

The toilet area is in need of painting, as is the prayer room. This will not cost much if we use voluntary labour.

It has been suggested that it would be good to have some extra lighting near the road in front of the church to light up the sign and for lighting up for the Christmas tree Festival. We need to be aware that anything placed on the grassed area beyond the concrete kerbing is actually on the road reserve and is illegal for the electrician to go beyond the boundaries of our property.

It has come to my attention that the PA speakers installed in the hall, kitchen & family room are not compatible with our new system. They do not give out a clear sound and are not able to increase volume. This will need looking into for costing of supply and installation of replacement speakers if needed.
